PRIORITIZING THE HEALTH OF THOSE WHO ARE MOST VULNERABLE



Maria is a 49-year-old farmer and mother of three. Her family lives in extreme material poverty, on a remote farm without access to running water. Almost a decade ago, she was diagnosed with cardiomyopathy caused by Chagas disease. Chagas is a neglected tropical disease that disproportionately affects indigenous and rural communities in the mountains she calls home.

A pacemaker kept Maria healthy and active while her children grew into teenagers and young adults. But by 2021, the battery had worn out. After hearing of our mission trip through a radio broadcast in her native Quechua language, Maria walked five hours to the town of Vallegrande and took two buses to Cochabamba to reach the office of our sister organization, Puente de Solidaridad. Two days later, Bolivian surgeon Dr. Benjo Gareca and U.S. missioner Dr. Marta Vakulenko replaced her implant with a new generator donated by Boston Scientific.

The Quechua announcement Maria heard is an important example of our extensive outreach efforts to identify those patients who are most vulnerable. Working together with *Plataforma Chagas*, a Bolivian public health program, we can coordinate this type of complex care for patients like Maria, who face extreme barriers in accessing medical care. In addition to the radio promotion, *Plataforma Chagas* covered Maria's transportation expenses and provided her with a Quechua interpreter.

Pacemakers allow patients to live longer, healthier lives but they require ongoing monitoring. That's why our Pacemaker Program not only implants devices but accompanies patients for the rest of their lives to make sure they receive continued care. Thanks to the partnership between Puente de Solidaridad, *Plataforma Chagas*, and Solidarity Bridge, Maria has access to the high-level care she deserves, and her light will shine on for years to come.

ENSURING DOCTORS HAVE THE NECESSARY RESOURCES TO SERVE THEIR COMMUNITIES

Since our founding, medical teams traveling to Bolivia and Paraguay have hand-carried high-priority surgical supplies and equipment that support the daily work of our medical partners. But with limited travel in 2021, we turned our focus to other ways of delivering resources—all so that the work of our local partners, and the care of their patients, would not be hindered by a lack of materials.

With the help of our partner, Hospital Sisters Mission Outreach of Springfield, Illinois, we shipped three maritime containers. This was no small feat in a year when the global supply chain was turned upside down by clogged shipping lanes, container shortages, and the impact of COVID-19 on dock and transportation workers. Puente de Solidaridad, our sister organization in Bolivia, received two of these shipments. They distributed the supplies to 73 facilities located throughout seven of the country's nine regional departments. The third shipment supported medical and surgical services in Paraguay.

We know these efforts are worth it when we receive feedback like the quote below from Dr. Carla Erika Salinas Ramos, a Bolivian anesthesiologist who supports our surgical programs.

PARTNERING IN A SPIRIT OF SOLIDARITY

Personal and professional growth is best fostered through mutually supportive human relationships. This is as true in the medical profession as anywhere else. That's why creating spaces for medical peers to work side by side, learning from each other and forming strong bonds of friendship, is at the heart of our mission. In 2021, we learned to do this more deeply, in-person and remotely.

Working virtually was vigorously embraced by our newly formed Neurosurgery & Neurology Institute (NNI). The NNI is an expansion of our Neurosurgery Program and is committed to alleviating the suffering, death and disability from neurological disorders and injuries that disproportionately impact patients in the countries where we serve.



Dr. Rebecca Garcia Sosa, a pediatric neurologist at Ann & Robert H. Lurie Children's Hospital in Chicago, has been a key contributor to the NNI's neurology focus. "As a Puerto Rican, I am always looking for ways to give back to communities in need. And as I learned about Solidarity Bridge from two of my colleagues, I quickly decided

to join them on their next trip to Bolivia," said Dr. Garcia Sosa. "Unfortunately, our trip was canceled due to political unrest in the fall of 2019, and then came the pandemic. As we brainstormed how to help our colleagues from afar, the idea of virtual conferences came up." Working together with Bolivian neurologist Dr. Víctor Hugo Cuéllar, Dr. Garcia Sosa organized a series of seven webinars on the clinical care of patients with epilepsy.



It has been a pleasure to work with Dr. Cuéllar and his colleagues. Partnering with physicians in other parts of the world feels like a blessing and a privilege. We learn from them and they learn from us, which helps everyone!

Dr. Cuéllar is one of only 20 doctors in Bolivia who have completed specialized training in Pediatric Neurology. As he works to expand care in this growing field, he knows close collaboration between specialists like himself and primary care providers is essential. Once diagnosed, nearly 70% of epilepsy cases can be controlled and seizures can be prevented

with simple and cost-effective interventions. But if primary care physicians do not have the training and resources to recognize and refer epileptics to specialists, or to oversee their long-term treatment, patients and their families may never be able to access the medical care they need.

Our webinar series on pediatric epilepsy extended training to more than 250 Bolivian pediatricians, neurologists, internists, nurses, and even parents of patients. Partnering with Solidarity Bridge and Dr. Garcia Sosa, Dr. Cuéllar is meeting the training needs of his colleagues in primary care settings. Together we're shining forth toward a higher level of care for patients with epilepsy.

FINDING SOLACE IN SOLIDARITY

The heart of our work expands beyond what we do in the hospital or clinic. Our cross-cultural efforts are centered on an openness to transformation in our lives, communities, and our wider world. In 2021, we co-hosted two retreats and symposiums creating space for US missioners and South American partners to grapple with the effects of the ongoing pandemic and reflect on their experiences of providing surgical care during this time.
